DELTA COUNTY AWARDED FIRE MITIGATION FUNDING FROM COLORADO STRATEGIC WILDFIRE ACTION PROGRAM

DELTA - The Colorado Strategic Wildfire Action Program (COSWAP) awarded Delta County 10-weeks of wildland fire fuels mitigation work valued at \$108,360. The mitigation work will focus on planned projects in Wildland Urban Interface(WUI) areas, strategically designed to protect the community in case of wildfire.

In November, the grant will fund two weeks of work that will begin clearing G50 Road in preparation for the new boat ramp area. The other eight weeks will be spent in Paonia and on the Grand Mesa, near Cedaredge, next summer. "Delta County is thrilled to be partnering with COSWAP to assist us on these incredibly important fuel reduction projects to immediately benefit Delta County communities with a focus on protecting life, property, and critical infrastructure." Said Delta County Administrator Robbie LeValley. "These crews will be a vital component of completion of some of the biggest fire mitigation projects the County has planned in 2022 and 2023."

The Colorado Strategic Wildfire Action Program (COSWAP) within the Department of Natural Resources was launched by Governor Polis' administration through the bipartisan SB 21-258 to invest in targeted wildfire risk mitigation, prioritize, and fund key mitigation projects. COSWAP is designed to quickly move \$17.5 million in state stimulus funds to start on-the-ground work on fuel reduction projects and increase Colorado's capacity to conduct critical forest restoration and wildfire mitigation work that will increase community resilience and protect life, property, and infrastructure.

The eligibility requirements of the COSWAP Workforce Development grant allowed for federal agencies, state agencies, local governments, tribes, public utilities with infrastructure or land ownership, registered homeowner associations, property owner associations, formal neighborhood associations, road districts, wildfire councils, or non-profit organizations that promote fuel reduction projects.





SHOOTING INCIDENT AT PARADOX TRAIL RESIDENCE

MONTROSE—On Oct. 6 at approximately 5:34pm, the Montrose County Sheriff's Office and the Montrose Fire Protection District's fire and EMS team were dispatched to a residence in the 19,600 block of Paradox Trail for a report of a shooting that occurred. Upon arrival, deputies located a 36-year-old female suffering from a gunshot wound to the shoulder.

The victim was transported to Montrose Regional Health and later transferred to St. Mary's Hospital in Grand Junction in guarded/stable condition. The suspect is Kristie Jones, a 63-year-old female, who was detained and later arrested by deputies. She is currently being held on a \$60,000 bond for attempted homicide, reckless endangerment, 1st degree assault, and prohibited use of a weapon. The shooting stemmed from an argument at the suspect's residence. The case is still under investigation.





MONTROSE COUNTY LOCAL LIQUOR LICENSING AUTHORITY

Commissioners left regular session to reconvene as the Montrose County Local Liquor Licensing Authority. They voted to approve the application for renewal of the Tavern Liquor License for Cedar Bowl Three Coins, 27802 CC Road - West 10th Avenue, Nucla, Colorado 81424, license #04-53646-0000. All appropriate documents, reviews, inspection, background check and fees have been submitted pursuant to CRS 44-3-302. No concerns were reported by the Sheriff's Office or the Planning Department.

GENERAL BUSINESS & ADMINISTRATIVE ITEMS

The BOCC voted to approve <u>a contract</u> <u>change for Change Order No. 4</u> in reference to the Federal Grant AIP - 56 for the Airport Terminal Expansion Project. This includes Non-Federal Items, COR 139 for repainting of the existing metal roof which was previously approved. COR-154 for relocation of AOA Gate 3 needs approval in the amount of \$25,270. This changes the cost of the work described from \$33,131,241.45 to \$34,160,729.50.

Also approved was a <u>contract change for Change Order No. 2</u> in reference to Construction of the Long Term and Rental Car Parking Lots for a total of \$128,263.23. This changes the cost of the work described from \$3,344,995.20 to \$3,472,485.90.

RESULTS OF SIMMS FIRE FACILITATED LEARNING ANALYSIS RELEASED

LAKEWOOD—Results from the Simms Fire Facilitated Learning Analysis (FLA) have been released and several resulting recommendations were made to minimize the risk of escaped prescribed fires in the future. The FLA was initiated since the source of the Simms Fire was determined to be a spot fire from the Simms Mesa Prescribed Fire. As a learning organization, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service was determined to study the actions that led to this unintended outcome to avoid similar mishaps in the future. The review included:

Facilitated Learning Analysis – This is a tool commonly used in accident investigations to improve future performance by learning from unintended outcomes; it helps decision makers and prescribed fire practitioners understand where things went wrong and what can be improved.

- -Fire Environment Analysis This is a review of the environmental conditions that influenced the fire's behavior in a way that was not anticipated.
- -Wildfire Review This is an evaluation of the

prescribed fire operation to ensure compliance with agency guidelines and burn plan elements and improve risk-informed decision-making in the future.

While the Simms Mesa Prescribed Fire was found to have been conducted within the burn plan parameters such as weather, fuel moisture content, adequate personnel, and contingency resources, recommendations were made to maximize success in future prescribed fire activities, including:

- -Review fuels in and adjacent to the burn area and ensure that the fuels are modeled accurately when developing a complexity analysis. -Ensure an on-site, properly functioning Remote Automated Weather Station to collect accurate and relevant weather and fuel moisture data.
- Include robust contingency actions and maps showing access roads, structures, and other values in burn plans, particularly when burning near homes and private land.

"Prescribed fire is a crucial management tool that reduces the risk of catastrophic wildfire while improving forest resiliency," said Chad Stewart, forest supervisor of the Grand Mesa, Uncompahgre and Gunnison (GMUG) National Forests. "It is also difficult work with inherent risks, but we will learn from this experience and move forward to protect local communities and the lands that we manage." Recommendations to help fire managers resume a safe and effective prescribed fire program were released by the National Prescribed Fire Review Team in early September, following the Forest Service nationwide pause on prescribed burning. Those, along with recommendations from the FLA, will be carried forward in the GMUG's prescribed fire program. For more information on the National Prescribed Fire Review, visit

A recent report by a western slope law enforcement agency stated that 60-80% of returning inmates are on (or should be on) antipsychotic drugs. Instead of burdening law enforcement, we need more mental health professionals to help these folks get the services they need to be productive citizens. We need more funding for co-responder programs, where both law enforcement and mental health professionals show up at the scene of a situation involving domestic violence, suicide, or substance abuse. These situations can often be defused by co-responding teamwork and getting that individual to a place (other than jail) where they can get the help they need. The City of Montrose Police Department and the Gunnison County Sheriff's Office are already implementing effective co-responder programs.

Teen Suicide

On the western slope, we continue to see teen suicide rates climb every year. Our children today are experiencing teen PTSD (anxiety and depression) brought on by social media bullying, teen domestic violence affecting 1 out of 10 teens, two years of COVID, and no apparent end to school shootings. I will fight for more funding for organizations like Peer Kindness, Axis Health System, and CASA, and find ways to expand collaboration between like-minded organizations focused on teen suicide and bullying.

Zinsli said, "they built a berm on the east side of that temporary road...they probably planted 50, 60, trees and plants in there...nobody maintains that.

"When they first opened that, I went over there and pulled the weeds. Well, I'm 81 years old now and I'm not going to do it anymore. They're not getting water to the plants...the weeds are so tall now that you can't even see the dead plants."

Zinsli said that the city has said the responsibility for maintenance lies with the golf course, while the golf course says that the city parks department is responsible. "Nobody is maintaining or taking care of it...it's just a waste of money as far as I'm concerned."

CONSENT AGENDA

Consent Agenda items were approved, including minutes of the Sept. 19, 2022, special City Council meeting and minutes of the Sept. 20, 2022, regular City Council meeting. Also included was approval to appoint applicants Grace Hotsenpiller, Ciana Beller, Maggie Ellen Kusar, Sydney Bell, Khloey Kuehn, Hunter Barton, and Caitlin Dovey to the City of Montrose Youth City Council for the 2022-2023 term.

TAVERN LIQUOR LICENSE TRANSER AP-PLICATION

Council voted to approve an <u>application</u> for the transfer of a Tavern liquor license at 1391 S. Townsend Avenue from BC Montrose LLC, d.b.a. Holiday Inn Express Montrose Bar, to CP Montrose LLC, d.b.a. Holiday Inn Express & Suites Montrose, Colorado, for consumption on the licensed premises. There has been a change of ownership; no changes to operations were noted. The applicants were present by Zoom, including Attorney Adam Stapen of Denver and Holiday Inn Express General Manager Marcie Giles.

NEW LODGING AND ENTERTAINMENT LIQUOR LICENSE APPLICATION

Council also voted to approve an <u>application</u> for a new Lodging and Entertainment liquor license at 1544 Oxbow Drive for Montrose Day Spa & Wellness Center, LLC, d.b.a. Montrose Day Spa, for consumption on the licensed premises. Applicant and business owner Wendy Campbell was present to answer questions.

ORDINANCE 2597-FIRST READING

As discussed previously in work session, Council voted to adopt <u>Ordinance 2597</u> on First Reading, repealing Subsection 6-1-28 (L) from the Official Code of the City of Montrose, Colorado, to remove a reference to an unused account.

WOODS CROSSING NORTH SUBDIVISION PRELIMINARY PLAT

Council accepted public comment before voting to approve the Woods Crossing North Subdivision Preliminary Plat expressly conditioned upon City staff ensuring that all policies, regulations, ordinance and Municipal Code provisions are met and that the Applicant adequately addresses all of staff's concerns prior to execution of the Final Plat. Speaking during the time allotted for public comment was Citizen Lori Webb, who expressed concerns about the infrastructure in the area. "I live right across from this proposed subdivision, which I know is going to go through," she said, and raised several concerns.

"...For 6720 Road, you have a 12-foot ditch right there on 6720 Road and Sunnyside," Webb said. "That is vacant land that he is giving the city...we were also told at the Planning Commission that that road would not be touched for at least 10 years. The traffic study that was done was done during COVID," she said. "So therefore, if you take zero cars and now you're going to put 287 homes, which is a total of 574 cars—that's just in the Woods Crossing North, that doesn't include what is up on 6800 Road and Sunnyside as well. You also have the catholic school...plus you also have the corner of Miami and 6720 which has also been huge thorn for a lot of people.

"I would like to see more open space on that corner of 6720 and Sunnyside," Webb said, "...Because you're getting five Acres... but you have nothing to be able to back it for later development of a road if he puts houses right there...there's no buffer...I think there needs to be a buffer like all the other subdivisions have...you're going to gridlock it again just like a lot of other subdivisions.

"Just don't make the mistakes that have been made in the past just because you want to put development in—think about the infrastructure."

Webb asked about low lighting as well. "There's a light right now on that Woods Crossing, I can see it a quarter of a mile away right now, and that's just one. What's going to be right across from me?" There were no further comments from the public.

Background-A memo from Planner William Reis to Council states, "The Woods Crossing Preliminary Plat will subdivide a 160.71 acre parcel into a residential subdivision. The property is bordered on south by Sunnyside Road, on the north by Miami Road, on the west by 6720 Road, and on the east by agricultural fields and singlefamily homes. The majority of the parcel (134+ acres) is zoned R-3 Medium Density District, with two B-4 Neighborhood Shopping District sections with the condition that multifamily residential uses are not allowed in these two areas. The residential lots proposed on this preliminary plat all fall within the R-3 Medium Density District. This preliminary plat proposes 287 single-family residential lots, a 5.42 acre dedicated public park, 11.17 acres of other open space, associated rights-of-way, and a 76.32-acre outlot for future development."

RESOLUTION 2022-13

Council voted to adopt Resolution 2022-13, setting Nov. 15, 2022, as the hearing date for Hilltop North Addition Annexation. Commenting on the map, Councilor Doug Glaspell asked whether the city would be splitting a road with the county, which was affirmed. "If you have a complaint, call the county first," Glaspell said.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR SHARED SERVICES

Council voted to approve the <u>Intergovernmental Agreement</u> between Montrose County and the City of Montrose for Liquor Licensing Shared Services. Following this approval, the <u>IGA</u> will automatically renew and may be cancelled by the parties at any time with 60 days' advance notice.

"The money they pay for that, we do keep," Councilor Doug Glaspell said of the fees paid by applicants. "The county doesn't get any of that."

GENERAL COMMENTS

Police Chief Blaine Hall said that the new Public Safety Complex would be open the morning of Thursday, Oct. 6, earlier than originally planned.

"We want to clearly educate the public that South First Street will be west bound only," he said.

Though one person had expressed confusion at the many doors of the new complex, Councilor Glaspell said that he heard "tons of very positive comments" from those who toured the new facility Sept. 27. "Congratulate you guys on that—it

was great."

Mayor Frank said, "I've heard from people that the response from the officers that were helping do the tours was so positive and so encouraging, and that they were excited to be moving into this new building, it really showed to the public that real positive outlook."

Said Police Chief Hall, "It's great to talk to people that want to talk to you, and it was a reminder to our officers that 99 percent of our community is filled with people just like those that came and visited us, and it was really refreshing. I was telling Bill, I really don't want to go back to my old job—I really liked that job."


Mayor Frank said that Montrose has just been chosen one of the top 25 desirable places to live in the United States.



CITY TO LOOK AT IMPLEMENTING STORMWATER UTILITY FEE; RECENT INCIDENTS AT GOLF COURSE TO BE ADDRESSED OCT. 17



City council has approved the award of \$74,261.25 for the safeguarding of a city-owned structure at 30 W South 4th Street (also known as the Bullock Power Plant).

MONTROSE-Montrose Mayor Dave Frank

opened the city work session of Monday, Oct. 3 and welcomed everyone. All councilors were present for the session.

Frank began the work session with an apology; a planned discussion of recent incidents at the City's Black Canyon Golf Course will not take place until Oct. 17.

"We've had some personnel issues, they're heavy to deal with...we want to make sure we have the people here to discuss that item...We want to make we have the right components in place before we discuss that...we want to make sure we have good information."

DISCUSSION ITEMS

The first item up for discussion was a Stormwater Utility Fee Study <u>Contract Award Recommendation</u>.

Public Works Manager Jim Scheid presented the recommendation. "Great time to talk about stormwater right after it rained all weekend. Some of our stormwater system in town...is definitely aging and nearing end of life."

As development has occurred the system has been patched together and there are capacity issues as well as aging infrastructure, Scheid said. The city prepared a master plan in 2009. Moving forward, Council will be asked to consider award of a contract with Carollo Engineers, Inc in the amount of \$54,404 for the completion of a Stormwater Utility Fee Study. Work would begin this year, with a final report and implementation in April of next year.

Mayor Pro Tem Barbara Bynum asked about fees, "We currently don't have a stormwater fund and this would look at possibly creating one...I guess the study would answer how much those fees would be and who would pay them...the study would generate information for us on who would pay a stormwater fee."

"...That's what we need a study for," Scheid said. "...what the rate is and how it's implemented, I guess that's what we don't know yet."

Mayor Frank asked whether the program would be scaled by basin. Scheid said that fee structures would instead be based on contributions to the system.

City Manager Bill Bell said that stormwater regulations place a burden on local municipalities and are passed down by the Federal Government in the form of unfunded mandates placed on the City, creating the need for a local stormwater fee. Background-A memo from Scheid to Council states, "Due to the aging stormwater infrastructure within the City of Montrose and the increasing requirements from the State of Colorado in regard to the treatment of stormwater, City Staff has requested proposals from consultants that specialize in utilities such as stormwater and the funding mechanisms that exist in similar communities to Montrose to conduct a comprehensive Stormwater Utility Fee Study..to provide a recommendation for rate fee structures for the Montrose City Council to consider, this study will include evaluating possible rate and fee structures by comparing them to benchmarks in the industry and to structures used by other agencies within the state of Colorado. The new approach under consideration would use a monthly stormwater fee based on the property's impact to the stormwater system. The stormwater utility billing system would be designed to create a system in which properties pay for their portion of the stormwater system's expenses and provide a predictable and sustainable funding source to properly maintain and update the stormwater system. This phase of the project is the "study," in which the consultant would provide recommendations and of rate structure formats. The consultant would provide options for the City Council to consider for a later phase of the project, which would be the "implementation" phase. The consultant would work closely with the City's finance department to be sure that any of the options provided would align with the existing billing system."

Council also discussed the possible authorization and award of \$74,261.25 for the safeguarding of a city-owned structure at 30 W South 4th Street (also known as the Bullock Power Plant), which was recently acquired by the City. The agenda notes that City Staff recommends that a contract in the amount of \$64.575 be awarded to Orion Environmental Inc. "A 15-percent contingency has been added to this quoted amount due to the uncertain nature of the work. The contract amount of \$64,575 plus a 15 percent contingency equals the total to be authorized of \$74,261.25. This is not a budgeted project and would be funded out of undesignated fund balance."

"Securing of the building is our first step, and shows commitment on our end," Scheid said. The item will come before Council for approval Oct. 18.

Background-A memo from Scheid to Council states, "The City purchased the former Bullock Power Plant in 2021 and has since been protecting the site and structure for future development possibilities and preparing for the pursuit of grant funding to remediate the site from environmental hazards. As a first step in this process the building and site need to be further secured and protected. The building is the focus for this contract recommendation and also the most urgent. The interior of the building is currently open to the weather, wildlife, and the potential trespasser. The building is also known to have environmentally hazardous materials such as asbestos that with grant funding could be remediated but in the meantime the structure needs to be secured to prevent the further spread of the hazardous materials. Due to the presence of hazardous materials, a licensed abatement contractor will be required to perform the work associated with the building security. The work will consist of the securing of any existing boards

covering windows and doors, the installation of new plywood and framing over any openings large enough for wildlife to enter on all levels, filling of mechanical and electrical system ducts and pipes protruding from within the structure, the barricading of existing doors and posting signage with the proper warnings of environmental hazards.

This work may require the removal of some of the trees that have grown next to the building."

City Clerk Lisa DelPiccolo presented the 2023 City Council Meeting Schedule and

<u>calendar</u>, and Council discussed rescheduling meetings that conflict with holidays. **COMMENTS**

Councilor Ed Ulibarri thanked Mayor Frank for sharing the information on the golf course work session. Councilor J. David Reed thanked Police Chief Blaine Hall and city staff for the grand opening ceremony for the new public safety complex. "...It was just a very momentous day for our city and our community."

City Attorney Ben Morris discussed serving on the Community Advisory Board for Pre Trial Services and said that the City had received a donation of \$100K from the estate of Deborah Hawk for the Municipal Animal Shelter. The money will help to supplement the animal services fund. Councilor Reed said that as an attorney he represents Second Chance Humane Society, which received a like donation. Scheid gave an update on the City's efforts to restore the former Wells Fargo Building.

City Engineer Scott Murphy said that open house meetings on the West Main Revitalization project were scheduled for later in the week.



ENEL GREEN POWER DEVELOPING SOLAR PROJECT

MONTROSE-Enel Green Power is developing a solar project in Montrose County. In North America the company is a leading developer, long-term owner, and operator of renewable energy plants with a presence in 14 U.S. states and one Canadian province. The company operates 64 plants with a managed capacity of over 8 GW powered by wind, geothermal and solar energy.

On Oct. 6, Enel held an open house at the County is aware of the project, but a for-Montrose County Events Center from from 5:30 -7 p.m. Although there was no formal presentation, the project team was available to answer questions and get community feedback.

Currently Enel does not have any operational renewable energy plants in Colorado; however, they have seven projects in development, two of which are on the Western Slope.

In May 2021 Enel began obtaining voluntary leases for a 1,052-acre solar project that will be located seven-miles northwest of Montrose, off Falcon Road. The project

will start construction in late 2023, with a completion target date of late 2024.

According to Strategic Economic Research, "The Olathe Solar Proiect is 140megawatt alternating current (MWac) utilityscale solar powered -electric generation facility that will utilize photovoltaic (PV) panels installed on a singleaxis tracking system. The project includes 70 MW of cludes: battery storage. The total Project represents an investment in excess of \$264 million."

The project has the capacity to power 31,000 homes.

Development Manager Emily Brumit said, "The project will interconnect with Tri State's substation in Peach Valley. The beauty of the project is that it is adjacent to the substation. There will be no transmission lines."

Enel has yet to enter into a power supplier agreement with Tri State.

According to the project team, Montrose mal presentation to the county has not taken place. The zoning on the land will not change once the project is operational and the estimated life of the project is 20-25 years. Enel has yet to determine whether agrivoltaics will be feasible for the site.

Sef Valdez, who is a third-generation farmer/rancher, will lease 500 acres to Enel. He said, "It's a benefit to the community and a benefit to agriculture." Last year, out of necessity, Valdez sold off his cattle to help offset the financial situation in agriculture. He said, "I want to pass my

property on to my children. We have to be more creative these days. It helps ag to stay more sustainable."

Enel Director of Sustainability Projects Jesse Puckett said, "We want to be a good neighbor and have a long-term partnership in the community. We want to understand the challenges in the community, and help meet those challenges. The key areas are STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) education and Fire and Emergency Preparedness. We've already met with the school district. [The project offers] diversity for power generation; it's great for Montrose County."

In the area of job creation, 200 employees will be needed during construction. Once operational the project will need two to three long-term employees. Puckett said, "It's easy to maintain."

Head noted that although the Enel solar project is not a large job creator, it has economic development impact. She said, "There is investment in construction and the property tax dollars. There is also value to people who own the land."

Development Manager Emily Brumit indicated there will be more community informational meetings; however, none are currently scheduled.

make a budget, write a letter, to name a few. Their test scores reveal that the majority are way below their grade level. Why is this the case?



The small town values with which I was raised are no different and no less important now than when I was growing up many years ago in our schools.

Our staff members and teachers are your friends, your neighbors, the people you sit next to at concerts in the park and at church and ball games.

Dorothy loved to ride horses with her children, grandchildren, and friends. Whether it was gymkhanas, trail rides, or jr. rodeos, she always loved to be on



SCENT: YOUR SENSE OF NATURE

REGIONAL-The sound of leaves crunching as you walk through the forest, the feeling of the warm sun on your face, the sight of a mule deer, the smell of a nearby campfire, and the taste of a freshly picked tart apple engage our five senses – sight, hearing, smell, taste, and touch. Together these senses help us get a clear picture of what is happening around us.

Have you ever taken a whiff of some smell that transported you back to a child-hood memory? Maybe the smell of basil makes you think of your grandmother's garden, or the smell of a campfire makes you think of a memorable camping trip. Does the smell of freshly cut grass or alfalfa confirm that summer is here? What smells remind you of autumn – the pungent organic smell of decomposing leaves in the forest, the fresh, moist scent of an oncoming snowstorm or the smell of roasted chili peppers?

Smell is an intriguing sense because of its wiring in our brains. Scents stimulate our olfactory cells, travel on a fast track through our brain's superhighway of connectivity, and bypass the brain's switchboard (the thalamus). Smell stimuli go directly to the region of our brain (hypothalamus) involved in detecting threats and stress responses, and hormones are quickly issued to the appropriate places. By going directly to this brain region, our body responds faster to smells, according to Johan Lundström, a neuropsychologist at the Karolinska Institute in Sweden (The Scientist: exploring science and inspiring innovation). Certain smells can quickly trigger a physical reaction within us. For instance, smells can make us feel sick or warn us of danger (fire) or can make us feel hungry if we smell something yummy.

Smell signals also go directly to another region of the brain called the hippocampus, which is responsible for forming and recalling memories.

A sense of smell is the only fully developed sense a fetus has in the womb, and it is the one that is the most developed in a child until the age of around 10, when sight takes over. A prominent aroma re-

searcher explained that because smell and emotion are stored as one memory, childhood tends to be the period in which you create the basis for smells you will love or hate for the rest of your life. And, like so many things in life, the sense of smell is impacted by aging. Although the cells that make up the olfactory system are replaced as they age and die, just like any cell, the rate of replacement slows after 50 years of age. To keep that keen sense of smell as you age, your olfactory cells need regular workouts, in terms of exposure and variety. It's a "use it or lose it" kind of thing. Have you ever felt more calm or relaxed when you breathed in the wonderful smells of a pine forest or the fragrant smells of a flower garden? Studies have also shown that the smells of nature are linked to lower physiological stress (The Scientist: Exploring Life, Inspiring innovation). Even though the sense of smell for adults often operates in the background behind other senses, natural odor stimuli has a swift and direct effect on our parasympathetic system, the processes that allow us to rest and digest. It has the greatest impact on lowering blood pressure and other physiological stress reduction factors. Our noses can distinguish more than 1 trillion scents, according to new research by the National Institute of Health. The findings show that our sense of smell is far more sensitive than previously thought. You and your children take in many different smells every single second of every single day. How often do you really consider what you smell, especially while you are exploring the great outdoors with your children?

Here are a few suggestions on how to get your kids to use their noses in nature:

-Smell a tree. Walk up to any tree and see if you can detect a smell. If you live near ponderosa pine trees, make sure to give

ponderosa pine trees, make sure to give their bark a sniff. They smell like vanilla or butterscotch and it is truly delightful. All trees have some sort of smell.

-Complete a nature-smelling scavenger hunt. You can use literally any nature scavenger hunt and smell the nature objects. Try to smell every item on your list and describe the way each item smells. Maybe even rank them from best to worst

smelling.

- -Put your nose to the ground. Investigate how different ground cover smells. How does grass smell compared to dirt? What about a ground covered in wet leaves, snow, sand, moss, a rocky riverbank, a muddy puddle, or any other walkable surface? They all have distinct smells and can be explored to your child's heart's content—or until they are thoroughly wet and muddy!
- -Stop and smell the roses, or any other flower you see. All flowers smell different, and ssniffing them is an easy way to pass the time in the spring and summer months. If wildflowers are not easily found, try visiting a flower shop or nursery to smell the flowers there.
- -Play a guessing game by scent. This is an easy way to use your nose to explore nature even in your own backyard! Gather a few nature items, like pinecones, grass, leaves, sticks, rocks, dirt, flowers, fragrant herbs, etc. and with your eyes blindfolded try to guess the items based on smell. Our sense of smell is an incredibly important part of our body and plays a role in how we perceive the world around us even as we age. Next time you are out with your children exploring nature, focus some of your observations on your sense of smell, particularly those smells associated with each season. You will be surprised at the lasting memories you can make! COLORADO PARKS AND WILDLIFE INVESTIGATING REPORT OF WOLF DEPREDATIONS ON U.S. FOREST SERVICE LAND NEAR MEEKER

Special to Art & Sol

MEEKER- Colorado Parks and Wildlife is investigating a report of dead domestic cow calves on White River National Forest lands near Meeker that show damage consistent with wolf depredation. This is an active investigation and CPW is working closely with the livestock producer to collect additional evidence, including looking for scat and tracks in the area. If the depredations are confirmed as being caused by wolves, CPW will work in partnership with the livestock producer to implement approved hazing methods and respond to any damage claims submitted.

It is important to note that no wolf reintroductions have taken place yet in Colorado and recent depredation incidents are not related to or a result of wolf reintroduction efforts in Colorado.

CPW personnel have received wolf-livestock depredation field identification and investigation training from Wyoming Game and Fish. CPW personnel are also well trained and have decades of experience identifying and investigating livestock depredations caused by other

depredating species.

CPW also works with Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) and other wildlife management agencies in certain circumstances to get professional opinions regarding wolf depredation investigations such as this, which further contributes to CPW's body of

knowledge in identifying wolf depredations. Wolf Resource Guide

A Wolf Resource Guide specific to wolf depredation has been developed that is available online and in printed format for distribution to livestock owners in Colorado who are experiencing wolf depredations.



Recently, the National Center for Safe Routes to School renamed the event Walk and Roll Day in recognition of all active and sustainable modes of transportation. Throughout the state, more than 150 schools participate every year.

Traditionally, Walk and Roll Day is held on the first Wednesday of October. The official date was moved by one week this year to make the event more convenient for all, since Yom Kippur falls on Wednesday, the 5th. Across Colorado, schools are celebrating throughout the month in meaningful ways.

"Almost all of our 500 students commute to and from school actively on a regular basis," says Melanie Wade, counselor at Rocky Mountain Elementary School in Clifton. "On Walk and Roll Days, we get to really celebrate that. Our Physical Education Teacher, Mark Garcia, always does such a great job organizing. This year, we're putting together a bike and scooter safety unit that we'll implement before the event, utilizing LaScooter scooters, which we received as the lucky winners of the Colorado Safe Routes to School giveaway."




