RESOURCES MAY BE LIMITED, BUT NEED IS NOT Mental Health Care options in Montrose

By Caitlin Switzer

MONTROSE-In urban areas, there may be overlapping services and multiple providers for people who live with a mental illness. The situation can be very different in rural areas and in smaller cities such as Montrose.

"As someone who has multiple friends with multiple mental illnesses, it wouldn't seem that there are multiple resources to help them," one young adult observed to the Mirror.

Resources may be limited but the need for services is not. The National Institute of Mental Health notes that nearly one in five U.S. adults live with a mental illness, but roughly half of those affected receive treatment.

Common illnesses include Bi-Polar disorder, estimated

VETERANS' GROUPS WORKING TOGETHER TO BRING VETERANS PLAZA PROJECT TO CERISE PARK

MONTROSE-The Montrose Veteran Memorial Coalition (501c3) was formed with the goal of building the Montrose Veterans Plaza, a memorial site representing America's major conflicts — WWI, WWII, Korean War, Vietnam War, and the Global War on Terror.

The proposed memorial site is in Cerise Park, between the parking lot and the Montrose Rotary Amphitheater. Vietnam Combat Veteran Dave Powers said, "We proposed to start construction in 2023 and do it as we go. We linked it to donations. The idea was we were going to do it as the funding came in."

However, the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed with the City of Montrose states the coalition cannot start





BLM ANNOUNCES NEW MANAGER FOR MCINNIS CANYONS AND DOMINGUEZ-ESCALANTE NATIONAL CONSERVATION AREAS

GRAND JUNCTION – The Bureau of Land Management Grand Junction Field Office is excited to welcome Amber Koski as the new National Conservation Area Manager. Koski will oversee McInnis Canyons and Dominguez-Escalante National Conservation Areas in western Colorado.

"Amber brings a diversity of experience to BLM Colorado and our National Conservation Areas," said Grand Junction Field Manager Greg Wolfgang. "We are excited to welcome Amber to western Colorado's amazing communities, partners, and landscapes."

Koski previously served as the Planning and Environmental Coordinator for BLM Utah in the Green River District in Vernal,

Utah. Amber was responsible for coordinating six resource management plan amendments that spanned three field offices and two districts for lands designated under the John D. Dingell, Jr. Conservation, Management, and Recreation Act. Areas included the Jurassic National Monument, John Wesley Powell National Conservation Area, McCoy Flats Mountain Bike Trail System, San Rafael Swell Recreation Area, and 63 miles of Wild and Scenic River segments and 17 new Wilderness Areas. Amber holds a bachelor's degree in anthropology with an emphasis in archaeology and a master's degree in environmental policy and management. Prior to her planning role, Amber served as the Assistant Field Manager of resources for

the Vernal and Price field offices.

percent of the U.S. population according to the <u>National Association on Mental Illness (NAMI)</u>. The average age-of-onset is about 25, but it can occur in the teens, or during childhood.

Other <u>common conditions</u> include schizophrenia, post-traumatic stress disorder, major depression, anxiety and mood disorders, panic disorders and phobias.

Prescription medication can help in some cases, and some patients are finding increased stability with <u>long-acting injectable options</u>. However, any medications must be prescribed and monitored by <u>a</u> gualified provider.

To learn more about supportive resources, *the Mirror* spoke with Paul Reich of <u>Axis Health Care</u>, the mental health services provider serving Montrose and

Delta counties. Axis merged with the former local provider, Center for Mental Health, in 2021.

For individuals experiencing a crisis, the Montrose Crisis Walk-In Center at 300 North Cascade Avenue is open 24 hours a day, seven days per week. Patients aged 12 and up can access the center for crisis stabilization, and stay for up to five days as needed, Reich said.

Telephone support is also available 24-7, with several options. The Axis Support Line locally is 970-252-6220. Colorado Crisis Services can be reached at 1-844-493-8255. You may also text "Talk" to 38255 to reach someone.

In recent years, local law enforcement agencies have taken strides to better serve people with mental health needs as

well. The Co-Responder program coordinated by Axis and law enforcement in Montrose and Delta counties has grown, and a number of officers have undergone crisis intervention training as well, Reich said.

Patients who are not in crisis but who need ongoing care can access regular treatment at the Axis outpatient facility at 605 Miami Road. Psychiatric care, nurse practitioners, prescription medication and monitoring, and case management services are available.

Axis accepts private insurance, as well as Medicare and Medicaid. For patients who self-pay, there is a sliding fee scale, Reich said. To learn more visit https://www.axishealthsystem.org/locations/montrose/.



LOCAL HOME SALES REFLECT STATEWIDE TREND

MONTROSE- the most recent statistics released by the Colorado Association of Realtors show that compared to September of 2021, the average sales price of a single-family home in Montrose County in September of 2022 has dropped by 2.9 percent, from \$458,681 in 2021 to \$445,204 in 2022. Still, year over year, the average sales price for a Montrose County home is on the rise. The average sales price for a single-family home has risen by 7.4 percent year to date, from \$430,797 in 2021 to \$462,890 in 2022. More inventory is also available this year; the statistics show a rise from 141 units in September of 2021 to 179 in September of 2022.

In neighboring Delta County, statistics reflect a similar trend. Year over year, the average price for a single-family home has risen from \$362,783 to \$433,087, an increase of 19.4 percent. When compared specifically to September of 2021 though, the average price of a single-family home in Delta County dropped from \$389,540 in 2021 to \$386,583 in 2022, a decrease of 0.8 percent. Inventory available has increased from 125 units in September of 2021 to 178 in September of 2022.

The trends in Montrose and Delta counties are reflective of the market statewide. Colorado Association of Realtors statistics for the entire state can be viewed here.



construction until they are fully funded. The total budget is estimated to be more than \$500,000.

The word-of-mouth community support and offers for in-kind donations from contractors, builders, and excavators have outpaced the building blocks needed for the project, i.e., a website, a marketing plan, and a financial structure for accepting donations.

Powers said, "I have full confidence, but we really can't start anything until we have a place for people to donate."

One encumbrance to the project is the need to relocate a Delta Montrose Electric Association (DMEA) powerline which runs through the proposed site. During the October DMEA meeting Powers gave the board an overview of proposed project, while also asking the electric utility for a \$31,000 in-kind donation to relocate the

powerline. The DMEA Board is supportive of the project and will reach out to the coalition with additional information regarding support.

During his presentation to the DMEA Board of Directors, Powers gave an overview of the proposed memorial site. He said, "A lot of people don't know about the project. It's 3,200 square feet, with pods that represent major conflicts. It will be lit at night. There will be a 32-foot flagpole lit with LED lights; six [military] service flags, and trails in and out of the structure. We'll construct park benches."

One fund-raising effort will include selling 2,200 name bricks. Powers said, "We haven't yet determined the cost. They will be 4 X 8 inches with three lines that celebrate the freedom we have, the sacrifice of veterans, and in memory names [of a loved one]. We think the plaza will give

the community an educational opportunity. It will offer recognition of the Veteran community and be a place to promote healing. The location will have a lot of exposure. It could become a tourist destination and an area for special events and awards."

The proposed Veterans Plaza project is having an unexpected benefit to Veterans groups. Powers said, "Our local veteran organizations [VFW, American Legion, and DAV] haven't always worked well together, but this project is pulling us together with a common goal."







ON WATER IN THE WEST

COLORADO-Over the course of this past
summer, I hit the road with my colleague
Kathay Rennels and traveled around the
state. This is a trip we try to make every
year when there isn't a pandemic – this
summer included stops in Greeley, Yuma,
Fort Morgan, Steamboat Springs, Craig,
Gunnison, Grand Junction, Center, Alamosa, Lamar, Rocky Ford, Castle Rock, and
Durango.

It's part of my role heading up the university system that delivers Extension, agriculture, and rural initiatives to Colorado – and Kathay's role as interim vice president of Engagement and Extension at CSU and one of the state's must trusted champions of rural Colorado. These trips are a time for us to listen, not talk, so we can get a clear picture of how we're doing in delivering on this core part of our mission.

For as long as I've been making these summer road trips, water has been a big topic of nearly every conversation. It's not a surprise: The history of the modern American West largely revolves around water, or the lack of it.

In fact, many of the great leaders in Colorado water history were connected to Colorado State University, among them Ralph Parshall, who came to the Fort Collins campus in 1899 as a student and became an international leader in civil engineering and hydrology. (He developed the Parshall Flume in the college's hydrology lab in 1921.) Parshall grew up on a family farm 16 miles west of Golden and recalled "dry-farming" acres of potatoes, oats, turnips, and wheat in the 1890s.

Just over a half century later, he noted how changes in the climate and precipitation levels had made those lush acres of crops on his family's land a thing of the past. In 1956, he gave a talk to the Fort

Collins Rotary Club, where he said: "About the state, the water situation is becoming acute. Stream flow practically everywhere is extremely low. ... Our population is growing at a steady pace which means more and dependable water supplies are needed to meet our needs. Examining the water problem we find the curve representing the population is rising and the curve showing the water supply is gradually dropping. As the years move on, these two curves get further apart, which indicates the serious situation we are approaching. People are on the move to live in Colorado, farmers are to be supplied with water, industry is expanding to use more water, and we are going downhill on water supply. What are we going to do about this problem?"

It's a question we keep asking, 23 years into a drought in the Colorado River Basin. And it's one of the reasons that our third building to open at the <u>CSU Spur</u> campus in Denver will be the <u>Hydro building</u> – a place focused on research, science, and learning around all things connected to water. Hydro, which will also house Denver Water's new water-quality laboratory and the Salazar Center for North American Conservation, will open in January in conjunction with the National Western Stock

It's also why now-Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack worked with us to establish an annual symposium run out of Spur that brings together diverse stakeholders to share multi-sector, non-partisan solutions to the complex and perplexing challenges of Western water.

This is clearly a high-stakes issue for Colorado agriculture and communities around the state. And it's tempting to view the challenges facing our Western states as distinct – but in reality, communities and populations around the world are grap-

pling with the same issues. For that reason, this year's <u>Water in</u> the West <u>Symposium</u> is looking globally at ways that cities, countries,

Tribes, and agricultural producers have pursued solutions and innovations that transcend boundaries and provide a useful roadmap for others.

I'm going to offer a shameless plug here and encourage any of you with an interest in water and its impact on Colorado and the West to sign up and join us Nov. 2 and 3. This symposium is designed not just for policymakers, producers, and conservationists but for all of us who understand the importance of a safe and reliable water supply to the health, vibrancy, and even survival of our communities. And if you're interested in learning more about the water situation in Colorado, look for the next issue of our STATE Magazine, which will come out early next year in conjunction with Hydro's grand opening. This is a conversation CSU will continue to engage – whether over coffee with farmers on the Eastern Plains or in our campus and Spur laboratories and meeting rooms - because answering Ralph Parshall's question ("What are we going to do about it?") demands our best science, collaboration, and thinking. The Colorado State University System includes Colorado State University in Fort Collins, Colorado State University Pueblo, Colorado State University Global, and the

public Spur campus in Denver.

Kevin Kuns – not the loudest, just the most effective.



DMEA HEARS FROM VETERANS MEMORIAL COALITION

MONTROSE-The Oct. 25, 2022 Delta Montrose Electric Association (DMEA) Board of Directors meeting, which was called to order at 3 p.m., was held at the Read Service Center, Delta. All board members were present, with Director Jock Fleming arriving at 4:45 p.m.

During meetings the board of directors hears verbal summary reports of their monthly meetings and activities; however, neither the co-op membership nor the media have access to the written reports submitted for board approval.

The call to order was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance, the opening meeting prayer, determination of a quorum, and approval of the consent agenda (Membership Report and Minutes from the September Regular Board Meeting). DMEA co-op members are afforded an

DMEA co-op members are afforded an opportunity to speak during Member Comments, which for this meeting were scheduled for 5:30 p.m.

Introductions:

Community members present were Mike Atwood (Paonia), Kent Cloward (Delta), Phil Stinnett (Cedaredge), and Dave Powers (Montrose).

Board Committee Reports:

Finance-Audit-Rate Committee (FAR) – Ken Watson, Chair.

Watson said, "A good meeting on October 11th at 1 p.m. All members were present and good participation from the rest of the board and staff. We discussed the budget and we will be posting monthly finance for public consumption [to be implemented in November with member access through SmartHub]. The Audit RFP [Request for Proposal] was sent to eight firms, we got back five responses. We'll be voting on that. The Capital Credit Retirement for 1991-1992 is approximately \$3M. It will be determined if it will be in dollars, or a credit on their bill. The CFO [Chief Financial Officer Gayle Gouker] gave us a robust discussion highlighting all the assumptions, expense codes, streamlining, short-term and long-term loans. Expenses were discussed. There is a 13-percent increase from last year which comes from inflation, investing in employees, and travel. We'll need furniture updates for DMEA

and Elevate. The CEO [Interim Chief Executive Officer Kent Blackwell] can hash that out sooner rather than later. We'll vote on it at the November meeting, three weeks away."

Eno Heuscher said, "Were there any concerns [from the FAR meeting]?

Watson said, "Nothing that sticks out. The debate was wide-ranging. There was appreciation for Gayle's work."

DMEA President Kyle Martinez said, "We went through everything line-by-line. It was a very thorough report."

Engineering - Con-

struction – Energy Services Committee – Stacia Cannon, Chair.

Cannon said, "Nothing to report."

Member Relations Committee – Bill

Patterson, Chair.

Patterson said, "We met on the 20th of October. We discussed the upcoming Annual Meeting and proposed the 15th of June. We're looking for a venue in the Cedaredge area. The Crisis Relief Fund is for people having trouble paying their bill. [The committee proposes to] continue the \$10,000 budget for that fund. On Board Elections the committee recommends retaining the current paper ballot that we have. There is a [member] survey coming up and we will be asking members if they want an electronic [election] or paper ballot."

Next year Patterson would like the board to look at what he feels is a disparity in representation on the board. He said, "Currently we have nine directors. The disparity is in different meters in the districts. Are we being fair to all our members because of geography? I don't agree with that [districts based on geography]. I'd like to take a look at it and bring it up." Vote on Annual Meeting Date. Approved Unanimously.

Vote on Crisis Relief Fund. Approved Unanimously.

Vote on Board Election Voting Methods to retain current SBS election organization. Approved Unanimously. In November the board will select a local holding company for ballots.

Executive Committee – Kyle Martinez, Chair

Martinez said, "We reviewed a list of CEO candidates. In December and January, we will continue that process."

Non-Privileged CEO Report – Interim CEO Kent Blackwell.

Blackwell reported on the legislative session, refining the Garnet Mesa solar project contract, formalizing a former passthrough agreement with WAPA. In the area of vegetation management Blackwell said, "We are discontinuing work with Four Seasons because of [their] staffing and equipment issues. There were several reports on incidents and near-misses [gas line not located, substation regulator]. October is Cyber Awareness month, we're 13 points improved over last month."

Blackwell's report included the 95 percent call answer rates, member appreciation events, youth leadership camp for high school seniors, and changing old

logos on equipment.

Financial Report with Variance Report – Gayle Gouker, CFO.

Gouker's report included margins, historically expected load drop-off, and hydro incentives. She said, "Total operating expenses [YTD] are under \$12 M, close to last year. For August we overestimated by \$21,000 [Guzman]."

Laughter rippled through the board when Martinez said, "Our last payment to Guzman was what, \$2.3 M? And you were off by \$21,000."

Non-Privileged Legal Report – Jeff Hurd, Attorney.

Hurd said, "I'll defer my report to Executive Session."

Representative Reports

Western United Electrical Supply (WUES) Report – Jock Fleming.

Fleming said, "We met. I sent the minutes out to everyone. It was a slow meeting. They are making money hand over fist. Another record-breaking month."

Colorado Rural Electric Association (CREA) Report – Damon Lockhart.

Lockhart said, "We haven't met. We meet the 5th of November. I'll have something next month."

Conference, Webinar, etc. Attendance Reports

Reports on recent webinars were given by Stacia Cannon and Jacob Gray.

Future Meetings

The next regular meeting will be Nov. 15 at 3 p.m.

The December meeting is rescheduled for Dec. 20.

Member Comments:

Paonia resident Mike Atwood spoke to the board about obstacles for members who want to be sustainable. He said, "If you [members] want to go sustainable, you [DMEA] are making it hard for someone who does not have capital. It's a policy thing for me. At least [consider] sharing the cost of financing for sustainable." As an example, Atwood offered his own experience of having to pay for a transformer that will then be owned by DMEA.

Martinez said, "Our policy has always been that development pays its own

way."

Atwood asked the board to also reconsider the policy that limits the number of solar panels members can have.

Montrose Veterans Memorial Coalition – Montrose Veterans Plaza Donation Request.

Vietnam Combat Veteran Dave Powers and Veteran Phil Stinnett (retired DMEA employee) approached the DMEA board on behalf of the Montrose Veterans Memorial Coalition requesting an in-kind donation of \$31,000 to relocate a powerline that encumbers the community war memorial site.

A diorama crafted by three Montrose High School ROTC students gave a visual of the memorial. Powers explained the design plans, "It's 3,200 square feet with pods representing major conflicts — WWI, WWII, Korean War, Vietnam War, and the Global War on Terror."

The proposed memorial site is in Cerise Park, between the parking lot and the Montrose Rotary Amphitheater. Powers said, "There is a three-phase line that runs through there along the sidewalk. The thing is in our way and we are asking for in -kind support. DMEA estimates \$31,288.49. We're asking for that essentially."

Fleming said, "The city is giving no money?"

Powers said, "Not yet."

Patterson said, "Is there any other benefit to moving the line? Will it serve us better than what we have now?"
Blackwell said, "Not really."
Flemings said, "Have we ever donated \$31,000?"

Executive Assistant Amy Taylor said, "We have [example Hotchkiss Parks]. We don't do it often, but it's not unheard of."

Following Powers' presentation, Martinez said, "The best thing is to discuss this in Executive Session. We'll let you know what we decide." Read the companion story on the Montrose Veterans Plaza in this issue.

The board reviewed and discussed the inkind donation request from the Montrose Veterans Memorial Coalition for a Veterans Plaza in Montrose. The Board is supportive of the project and will reach out to the Coalition with additional information regarding said support.

The board unanimously re-entered executive session to address the CEO search update with staff vacating the meeting at this time. The board unanimously exited executive session at 7:57 p.m.





2022 GENERAL ELECTION INFO

DENVER— With the 2022 General Election on November 8, the Colorado Secretary of State's Office is reminding Coloradans of important voter information.

"November 8th is just around the corner, and there is still time for eligible Coloradans to register to vote and cast a ballot for the General Election," said Secretary Griswold. "Voters should remember to use a trusted source for accurate election information like your county clerk or GoVoteColorado.gov!"

County Clerks have mailed ballots to voters for the General Election. Registered voters who did not receive a ballot should contact their County Clerk.

Eligible Coloradans can still register to vote and update their voter registration at <u>GoVoteColorado.gov</u> through October 31st in order to receive a ballot in the mail. After October 31st, Coloradans can still register to vote, receive a ballot, and vote in person at a voting center until 7 p.m. on Election Day.

Important information for Colorado voters:

- -All Colorado voters can sign up to track their ballot from sent to counted using BallotTrax.
- -Eligible voters who wish to mail back their voted ballot should do so by October 31st to ensure it is received by their county election official by November 8th. After October 31st voters should return their ballot to a drop box or voting center, or vote in person.
- -This year 411 drop boxes and over 350 voting centers are available. Voters can look up the closest locations and hours at <u>GoVoteColorado.gov</u>.
 -In person voting on Election Day, Tuesday November 8th, will be available from 7 a.m.-7 p.m.
 -Eligible voters must return their ballot to a drop box or voting center by 7 p.m. on Election Day or be in line to vote by 7 p.m. on Election Day for their ballot to be counted. Ballots cast by military and overseas voters must be sent no later than 7 p.m. on Election Day and received by close of







\$3 MILLION IN GRANT FUNDING FOR EV CHARGING STATIONS ANNOUNCED

COLORADO-A state program that provides grants for installing community-based electric vehicle charging stations has announced a new \$3 million funding cycle with increased grant amounts.

The Colorado Energy Office's Charge Ahead grant program helps cover the costs of purchasing and installing EV charging stations in workplaces, apartment/condo complexes, government buildings and other sites that offer public or visitor parking.

Most types of qualifying projects are eligible for grants of up to 80 percent of costs. New this cycle, the program is offering up to 90 percent for installations in income-qualified housing developments, as well as additional incentives for projects in disproportionately impacted communities.

The deadline for applications is Nov. 16, except for workplaces and multi-family housing complexes applying for projects of three or fewer Level 2 stations, which are accepted on an ongoing basis.

Grant application information and materials are available at the website energyoffice.colorado.gov (search for "Charge Ahead"). Prospective applicants can receive free technical advice and grant support from Carbondale-based Clean Energy Economy for the Region (CLEER), which is the Colorado Energy Office's designated "coach" for 14 counties on the Western Slope. CHRISTMAS TREE PERMITS AVAILABLE AT LOCAL VENDORS AND GMUG OFFICES

DELTA – Christmas tree permits will be available for purchase at local vendors and Grand Mesa, Uncompange and Gunnison (GMUG) National Forests offices beginning Nov. 10. The cost per permit is \$8 and may be purchased with cash, check or credit card. There is a maximum of five tree permits per person. Over the counter permits will be available and valid from Nov. 10 -Dec. 31, 2022. Christmas tree cutting is allowed in most areas on the GMUG with the following exceptions: Wilderness, scenic pullouts, commercial timber sales areas, recreation and ski areas, campgrounds, trailheads, developed sites and administrative areas and otherwise as detailed in the package provided with your permit. Trees may not be cut within 100 feet of any road or trail. Trees must be less than 20 feet tall from the stump, may not be greater than 6 inches in diameter at the base of the tree and the stump height should be no greater than 6 inches high. Topping trees is not allowed (i.e., cutting only the top of the tree and leaving the bottom with limbs attached).

Trees are for personal use only and cannot be resold. The tags must be attached to the tree at the cutting location and must be left on the tree until it arrives at its final destination. Maps showing where Christmas tree cutting is allowed are available at all offices where permits are sold and will be provided with permits along with a regulations list.

The GMUG is pleased to continue the 4th Grade Free Christmas tree Program again this holiday season. Fourth-graders are eligible for a free Christmas tree permit through Every Kid Outdoors Initiative. Every Kid Outdoors is a nationwide call to action to build the next generation of conservationists. All fourth-graders are eligible to receive a fourth grade pass that allows free access to federal lands and waters across the country for a full year. In support of this initiative, the Forest Service will make available a free Christmas tree permit to every interested fourthgrader who presents a 4th Grade Pass or

paper voucher at any GMUG office loca-

<u>Instructions on how to obtain a pass and</u> collect a free tree permit:

In order for students to receive a free Christmas tree permit, they must present a valid 4th Grade Pass or paper voucher printed from Every Kid Outdoors website: https://everykidoutdoors.gov/index.htm. To earn the voucher, simply visit the website, click on the "Get Your Pass" button and follow the instructions to obtain the voucher.

Print out the paper voucher and bring it with you to a District Office on the GMUG. The Forest Travel Management Plans and or weather conditions may close various forest roads before or Nov. 30. As a reminder, Motor Vehicle Use Maps (MVUMs) have been produced for the entire Forest and show forest roads, trails and areas that have been designated for seasonal closures. Motorized users are responsible for obtaining an MVUM to determine where one can drive, ride and recreate. These maps are free and are available at District Offices or on the Forest website: http://www.fs.usda.gov/ gmug. Snow and winter conditions will dictate road access for Christmas tree harvesting. Conditions associated with winter travel on forest roads may include, but are not limited to heavy snow, ice, soft shoulders and constantly changing road conditions.
