MONTROSE-At 930am on July 5, Montrose Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) Chair Sue Hansen called the regular meeting to order. All commissioners were present.

BOCC Vice Chair Roger Rash led all in saying the Pledge of Allegiance.

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at 4pm on Friday, July 21 and Showmanship & Agility set for Tuesday, July 25 at Noon.

Open Show and Livestock competitions will run throughout the week, with Community Night starting at 5:30pm on Tuesday, July 25.

Expect a few changes to Community Night, Field said. The Kiddie tractor Pull will be held in the outside arena this year, and local band Neon Sky will perform at 7:30pm.

Field said that there is some uncertainty as to the actual age (138? 139?) of the Montrose County Fair. Still, whether the Fair began in 1884 or 1885, there's no question that it's going strong today. Main draws like the rodeo and bull riding events sell out every year, and attendance for those has done nothing but increase. "In 2021, I had to turn away 250 people," Field said. "The next year, I had people lining up at 4:30pm."

While the Montrose County Fair does draw a high level of interest for its sold-out professional events, the heart of the fair has always been the amateurs of all ages who take part, he said.

"We want to showcase the talents of the community," Field said.

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



#### **COUNTY MANAGER**

County Manager Jon Waschbusch had no changes to the meeting agenda.

#### **CONSENT AGENDA**

Commissioners voted to approve Consent Agenda items, assigning Resolution No. 29 -2023 to Item 10, a resolution to change the posted speed limit on Popular Road from 30 mph to 35 mph from Old Paradox Road to Spring Canyon Road and from 30 mph to 45 mph from Spring Canyon Road to 6250 Road. The change is based on a traffic study following the recent paving of the road, which found that designed and constructed vertical curves on the section

of Popular located from Old Paradox Road east to Spring Canyon Road allow for a posted limit of 35 mph, while a speed study performed after paving and paint striping was completed revealed an 85 percent speed of 46.7 mph between Spring Canyon Road and 6250 Road. A curve in the Popular Road near the Chipeta Water District filling station was removed, County Engineer Keith Laube said.

#### MONTROSE COUNTY LOCAL LIQUOR LI-CENSING AUTHORITY

Commissioners left regular session to reconvene as the Montrose County Local Liquor Licensing Authority, and following a public hearing voted to approve the Chair's signature on a <u>Special Events Permit</u> for the Montrose County Fair Board at Montrose County Fairgrounds on July 28 and July 29, 2023 based on <u>Findings</u>.

# GENERAL BUSINESS & ADMINISTRATIVE ITEMS

Commissioners voted to adopt a <u>proclamation declaring July 2023 as Park and Recreation Month</u>. The proclamation was read into the record by Jeremy Master of the Montrose Recreation District.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT Commissioners voted to approve seven minor subdivisions as presented by Planning & Development Director Tallmadge Richmond.

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



# BLM SOUTHWEST DISTRICT RAC SHEEP GRAZING SUB-COMMITTEE TO MEET JULY 18

MONTROSE – The Bureau of Land Management Southwest District Resource Advisory Council will hold the fifth meeting of a sub-committee formed to study domestic sheep grazing in bighorn sheep habitat on July 18 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The discussion will focus on best management practices and public outreach tools related to livestock grazing and bighorn sheep on BLM-administered lands. The subcommittee will convene at the BLM Uncompander Field Office, 2465 S. Townsend Ave., Montrose, CO. The meeting is open to the public.

A thirty-minute public comment period will be provided from 12:45 p.m. to 1:15 p.m. Individuals who wish to speak are

encouraged to submit a written copy of their statement for the administrative record. Interested parties unable to attend the meeting in person are invited to join online via Zoom (registration required): <a href="https://blm.zoomgov.com/meeting/register/vJltcemqqjksGfgNBWuWpE-HfFgQlpC1jRQ">https://blm.zoomgov.com/meeting/register/vJltcemqqjksGfgNBWuWpE-HfFgQlpC1jRQ</a>.

"During our fifth meeting, we plan to discuss best management practices and public outreach tools related to domestic sheep grazing and bighorn sheep," said **District Manager Stephanie Connolly**. "Following the July meeting, the subcommittee will meet one more time in August prior to formulating its recommendations to the full RAC."

The Southwest District Resource Advisory

Council advises the BLM Colorado Southwest District, which includes the Gunnison, Uncompangre, and Tres Rios field offices. The sub-committee consists of five members who have demonstrated their interest and experience related to sheep grazing. The sub-committee will aim to present their conclusions to the full Resource Advisory Council for their consideration in fall 2023. #### STAGE 1 FIRE RESTRICTIONS BEGIN JULY 10 IN BLM TRES RIOS FIELD OFFICE

DOLORES – Stage 1 fire restrictions go into effect July 10 for all public lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Tres Rios Field Office within the boundaries of Archuleta, Dolores, La Plata, and Montezuma counties, as well as the northwest portion of Montrose County and western half of San Miguel County, including Canyons of the Ancients National lowing acts are prohibited: Monument. The restrictions align with local orders and guidelines to protect the public's safety during high fire danger.

"Increasingly dry conditions and high fire danger require the Tres Rios Field Office to implement Stage 1 fire restrictions," said Tres Rios Field Manager Derek Padilla. "We ask the public to please abide by these restrictions and remember that fireworks are always prohibited on public lands."

Under Stage 1 Fire Restrictions, the fol-

-Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire or campfire except within agencyprovided fire grates at developed recrea-

tion sites. Devices using gas, jellied petroleum, or pressurized liquid fuel are permit-

-Smoking, except in an enclosed vehicle or building, a developed recreation site, or while stopped in an area at least three feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of all flammable materials.

-Operating a chainsaw without a USDA or SAE approved spark arrester properly installed and working, a chemical fire extinguisher of not less than 8 ounces capacity by weight, and one round point shovel with an overall length of at least 36 inches. -Using a welder, either arc or gas, or operating acetylene or other torch with open flame, except in cleared areas of at least 10 feet in diameter with a chemical pressurized fire extinguisher of not less than 8 ounces capacity.


-Using exploding targets.

Stage 1 fire restrictions on these lands become effective at 12:01 a.m., MDT, July 10, 2023, and will be in place until further

Violation of federal fire restrictions is punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 or imprisonment for not more than 12 months or both. In addition, those found responsible for starting wildfires will also face restitution costs of suppressing the



#### **'BIDENOMICS' MEANS TREASONOUS SCHEMES TO ENRICH BIDEN FAMILY**

Skyrocketing inflation, record high gas prices, and trillions in reckless inflationary spending on leftist pet projects are just a few of the ways the Biden administration has punished the American middle class. When the vast majority of Americans realize Biden's economic policies --- which can charitably be summed up as "borrow and spend, tax and regulate" --- are a disaster, Biden's handlers react with a familiar strategy: Lie. Use rhetoric and smoke and mirrors to hide the results. When voters finally wake up and hate what you are doing, don't change. Just market it differently, and call it "Bidenomics".

Biden just declared that his economic policies are doing wonders for the nation's economy. 1) He declared that the U.S. has had the highest economic growth rate in the world since the pandemic. Blatant lie. We rank 146th in real GDP growth so far this year, and 151st place last year. 2) He declared "We created 13.4 million new jobs". Also false. Fully 10 million of those jobs were people returning to their previous jobs before the pandemic. Postpandemic job returns are not job creation. The number of new jobs is considerably less than 4 million --- which is nothing to brag about, given the working age population has grown by almost 7 million since Biden took office. 3) Biden declared that "Americans are back to work who have been on the sidelines ...". Another falsehood. There are almost 10 million people who've dropped out of the labor force, which is 2.7 million higher than it was just

before all the COVID lockdowns. 4) "Just in my first two years in office, my team and I have reduced the deficit by \$1.7 trillion." Biggest lie yet. The CBO report released at the start of this year showed that "Biden sharply increased the deficit last year, this year, and next year, and he has set the country on course to add a total of \$5.45 trillion to the federal deficit over the following decade."

Democrats cannot disguise the underlying reality: Not only has Biden presided over a sharp decline in real hourly earnings, his policies resulted in the loss of purchasing power and a decline in the standard of living for working Americans. The only thing Biden said that was truthful is that "Bidenomics is working." If you accept that his goal is to damage the working class, he is correct.

The entire Democrat Party platform is now predicated on fear-mongering and based on easily verifiable lies, particularly about Republicans. I could list a dozen examples, but here are just a few: \*Republicans only want to give tax breaks to the wealthy. Fact: IRS data verified that the Trump tax cuts disproportionately benefited those earning less than \$50,000 per year. Under Trump's tax plan the more money a person earned, the higher their income was taxed. \*Republicans are banning books and refusing to teach about slavery. Fact: Florida Governor DeSantis removed books from classrooms that contained pornographic content and other types of violent and inappropriate behavior. Teaching students about slavery is different than segregating a classroom along racial lines into groups of evil white "oppressors" and "the oppressed", while telling seven-year-olds that America remains an irredeemably racist country. \*Republican-led states like Georgia want to make it harder for minorities to vote. Fact: The Peach state just set a record for voter turnout in the midterms. It's hardly racist to require every American to provide a valid ID to vote. What is racist is to imply that black people somehow don't have the ability to get a driver's license or other form of ID. \*Republicans want to deprive Americans from receiving healthcare. Fact: Socialized medicine is a disaster that will cause millions of Americans to lose their healthcare plans, while dramatically lowering the quality of that

A logical question to ask is "Which groups have benefited from Democrat policies?" No amount of subterfuge can hide the fact that outside of Democrat special interest groups, the Biden family including Biden's corrupt son, and our chief adversaries around the world, it is hard to think of anyone. It is certainly not the American working class. ## PALISADE PLUNGE OPEN FOR THE SEASON

GRAND JUNCTION— The Grand Mesa, Uncompander and Gunnison (GMUG) National Forests in partnership with Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and Colorado Plateau Mountain Bike Trail Association (COPMOBA) announce the popular Palisade Plunge Trail is open for the 2023 season.

The Palisade Plunge is a 32-mile trail that features a unique 6,000 foot descent for mountain bikes and other nonmotorized recreation from the top of the Grand Mesa to the Town of Palisade. Access to the trail begins at the Mesa Top Trailhead along Highway 65 or from other approved access points along the trail such as Shirttail Point Trailhead or the Wild Rose Picnic area off

Land's End Road or the Palisade Plunge— Palisade Rim Trailhead off Highway 6. Recreation managers urge users to use caution and be aware of brushy and overgrown areas, loose rocks, trail erosion, downed trees and creek crossings with high flowing water.

GMUG trail crews have been working to unblock drainage structures, clear trees and debris and brush the corridor of the trail. Trail crews will continue to survey conditions and work to clear the remainder of the trail as weather permits.



# MONTROSE RECREATION DISTRICT SIGNS RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF EFFORTS TO HELP SOLVE LOCAL CHILDCARE SHORTAGE

MONTROSE— The Montrose Recreation District has passed a unanimous resolution in support of the Unify Montrose project to help solve the local childcare shortage. In Montrose, there are three times more children than there are available, licensed childcare spots. According to the 2021 Montrose County Childcare Needs Assessment that was published, Montrose County is classified as a 'childcare desert'. The local childcare shortage affects multiple aspects of daily life in Montrose, including the economy.

Unify America is driven to help Montrose residents find a solution through the Unify Montrose project. Unify Montrose is hosting a process starting this summer to review the childcare shortage issue and build solutions — led by residents. A large panel of Montrose neighbors, who represent all parts of the community, will review the facts, discuss the pros and cons of different solutions, and build an action plan.

"The serious shortage of childcare in Montrose impacts everything from public safety and healthcare to education and economic development. We are so appreciative of the support, endorsement, and contributions of the Montrose Recreation District to help solve the problem of this 'childcare desert.' Together, with leaders and neighbors from all parts of Montrose, we can protect our community and its next generation," says Sara Drury, a representative of the Unify Montrose project and Unify America's Executive Vice President of Deliberations and Community Problem-Solving.

To safeguard our community and our youngest generation, the Montrose Recreation District Board of Directors unanimously passed a resolution stating they support, endorse, and will contribute to the Unify Montrose efforts.

"The Montrose Recreation District is central to the vitality of our community, and as such plays a key role in the leadership toward forming solutions to continuously

improve Montrose. Childcare, collaboration, and community focus are things we do well, and the Board and staff are enthused to play a role in this initiative that indeed will have long-ranging, generational impacts," says Mari Steinbach, Executive Director of the MRD.

Local residents from all walks of life are encouraged to apply to be randomly cho-

sen for the 64-member Community Panel. Applications can be submitted online at <u>unifymontrose.org</u> or via a direct mail piece that should arrive in mailboxes in July. The deadline to receive applications for the Community Panel is July 31.

Selected panelists will be notified in August and paid for their time serving as a participant.

#### OXEYE DAISY CAN SNEAK INTO YOUR GARDEN

SAN MIGUEL COUNTY — San Miguel County Vegetation Control & Management manager, Julie Kolb has an update on how one noxious weed can sneak into your garden. The Oxeye Daisy is often sold in seed packets under the common names marguerite, dog daisy, field daisy, moon daisy, moon-penny, poor-land penny, poverty daisy, and white daisy. This daisy now infests the areas surrounding Telluride, Mountain Village, and Ophir. The daisy originates from Europe and Asia and is an invasive and destructive noxious weed that has shallow roots and leads to expedited erosion!

- -How to identify Oxeye daisy:
- -Seeds germinate during summer or fall
- -Has spoon-shaped lower leaves and linear flower leaves on upper stem
- -Stems are hairless
- -Flowers 1-2 inches wide
- -Is a perennial (grows back year after year)
- -Peak bud production June-September
- -One flower per branch
- -Produces about 200 seeds (or more) per





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

#### THE BEGINNING OF THE END OF THE WAR IN UKRAINE?

SILVER SPRING ,MARYLAND-Unless you are a peace activist, or work for the Pentagon or a weapons contractor, you are likely (blissfully) unaware Congress is about to take up the National Defense Authorization Act, the massive policy bill on Pentagon spending and related military and foreign policy functions. It will likely get nearly \$900 billion this year while social programs get short shrift.

Among more than 1500 proposed amendments to the bill on various issues are some that seem a bit oriented toward peace, including ending US support for the Saudi-led war in Yemen (and fully supporting the nascent peace process), assessing nuclear weapons systems and policy, and limiting US weapons transfers.

An amendment offered by US Rep. Warren Davidson (R-OH) could offer a way out of the disastrous war in Ukraine, for the Biden Administration, Russia, and Ukraine itself.

The amendment is relatively modest and straight-forward, requiring the Biden Administration to report to Congress on its strategy, objectives, projected costs, and perhaps most importantly, its diplomatic engagement (or lack thereof) to hasten the end of the war.

The timing of Davidson's amendment may be fortuitous, coming on the heels of a July 6 NBC News report on previously secret, "track two" talks between former US government officials and Russians including Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov. It is also very likely official, "track one" government-to-government talks are also ongoing but not publicly acknowledged. At the least, the amendment is a good governance, Congressional oversight, checks and balances measure on the Executive Branch, which wields enormous power over military and foreign policy.

It could be more than that, if it passes Congress, becomes law, and gets the attention it deserves. Russia's invasion of Ukraine is illegal, and a calamity for both countries.

The U.S. and other outside powers, while they are far from neutral, disinterested parties, may be needed to bring their influence to bear on ending the war. Over the last several decades, Congress, representing the American people, has become entirely too deferential to presidential power on war and peace issues. This amendment would add to a growing trend to correct that imbalance.

The Biden Administration, for its part, has to know the US cannot endlessly write blank checks to Ukraine for weaponry. Congress at some point will tighten the purse strings. Also, President Biden presumably would like to run for re-election free of this headache, understandably preferring to focus on the economy and improving the lives of people in this country.

I won't attempt to speculate on the motivations or self-interest of the Ukrainian or Russian governments. But for the people of those two countries, so closely linked by history and culture, this war, which looks to be an intractable stalemate, can't end soon enough, with negotiations to settle all manner of issues to be determined by the parties with whatever outside help is required.

Every day, people dying on both sides is a needless tragedy. The Davidson Amendment could be a turning point to end this madness. It deserves strong, bipartisan support.

#### IMPORTATION OF CRAYFISH INTO COLORADO-CPW SEEKS PUBLIC INPUT

DENVER - Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) is asking the public for their input on the importation of crayfish into the state. The public comment period is open through July 30, 2023. Recently, CPW has become aware of a significant market for live crayfish that are primarily imported into Colorado from outside of the state. CPW believes that the major species being imported is the red swamp crayfish, a species that is currently not allowed to be imported or possessed in Colorado. Regulations prohibiting the import, transport, and possession of most live crayfish into Colorado have been in place for decades in an effort to protect Colorado's natural aquatic ecosystems and native species. Rusty crayfish in particular have been a top invasive concern for CPW since their detection in the state in 2009. In response to this emerging market for red swamp crayfish, CPW is reviewing current crayfish regulations, and seeking input from the public on importing red swamp crayfish into Colorado.

#### **Public Input Process**

Members of the public can learn more about the regulation review process and share their feedback at EngageCPW.org through July 30, 2023.

Crayfish regulations are tentatively scheduled to be discussed at the July 17, 2023 Fish Health Board (FHB) Meeting and the August 24-25, 2023 Parks and Wildlife Commission (PWC) meeting. More information on these meetings will be available on the <u>FHB page</u> and the <u>PWC meetings page</u>.

## PRESCRIBED BURNS PLANNED DEPENDING ON CONDITIONS

MONTROSE — Fire Management Officials from the Grand Mesa, Uncompany and Gunnison (GMUG) National Forests' Ouray Ranger District had planned to conduct the 25 Mesa prescribed burn July 6, but the burn was cancelled due to a shift in the forecast conditions.

After the 25 Mesa prescribed burn is completed and if conditions remain favorable, fire managers will then conduct the Sawmill Mesa prescribed burn.

The prescribed burns are located approximately 25 miles west of Delta, Colorado on 25 Mesa road–National Forest System Road #503. Up to 2600 acres are planned to be burned to increase the resiliency and reproduction of native ponderosa pine stands, protect adjacent private property from the spread of unplanned wildfires, improve wildlife habitat and reduce slash from mechanical treatments.

Fuel moisture, weather and soil moisture conditions differ at elevations. Both projects are located above 8,300 feet in elevation where vegetation is still in the green up process and fuel and soil moisture content is higher compared to lower elevations. Below normal temperatures, combined with above average precipitation this spring, provided ideal conditions for burning at higher elevations. Currently, the Rocky Mountain Region is at a Preparedness Level 2, meaning geographic areas are able to manage fire activity without requesting many wildland fire suppression resources from other areas. The Preparedness Level and the predicted moderated fire weather factors into the extensive planning process for these projects. Prescribed burning is a tool that reintroduces fire into the ecosystem to promote and regenerate healthy trees and habitat conditions. Before conducting a

prescribed burn, extensive planning takes place to establish proper parameters such as weather, fuel conditions, smoke dispersion, staffing and other agency coordination. Significant coordinating efforts occur with local landowners, protection partners and other cooperating agencies to ensure the burn is conducted safely.

The prescribed burns will be accomplished using joint-agency fire resources utilizing aerial and hand ignitions and will be closely monitored to ensure that they remain within the designated boundaries. In an effort to provide additional resources to the projects, a special Prescribed Fire Incident Management Team will be deployed specifically for these projects and weather stations will be established to monitor and predict wind and humidity conditions at the project sites. Extra patrols will also monitor the prescribed fires and mop-up the perimeter fire lines.

As part of the team, an Air Resource Advisor will also be assigned to the prescribed burns and air quality will be closely monitored to mitigate smoke related impacts to communities. Smoke may be visible in Norwood, Telluride, Montrose and Ridgway communities for several days and may impact Sanborn Park area residents.

The safety of firefighters and the public are the most important factors considered when planning prescribed fires. Fire managers have obtained smoke permits from the State of Colorado and will comply with Colorado State air quality regulations. #### **AVALANCHE CONTROL PROJECT ON US 550 RED MOUNTAIN PASS TO BEGIN**

SOUTHWEST COLORADO — On July 10, the Colorado Department of Transportation will begin the installation of new avalanche control equipment above US Highway 550 over Red Mountain Pass, between Silverton and Ouray. The project will consist of installing remote avalanche control systems at three known snow slide path locations. Work will take place near the pass summit above the highway, at the Blue Point and Blue Willow slide paths (Mile Point 81), and near the Alpine Loop start at the Mother Cline slide path (MP 89). Geovert of Broomfield, CO, is the prime contractor on this project. The project involves the installation of Gazex and O'bellx fixed avalanche control systems and construction of their concrete bases and control shelters. The systems operate by mixing oxygen and propane, or hydrogen gas, in exploder nozzles at the top of high-risk zones. When the gas mixture explodes, the force of the explosion is directed down toward the snow, producing a controlled avalanche.

"These are the first fixed systems to be installed on US 550, and the units are being set at the most ideal locations to more effectively trigger these known slide paths," CDOT Southwest Region Transportation Director Julie Constan said. "As in other

locations across our state's mountain passes, the remote-controlled systems will enable more efficient avalanche control, making the areas safer for CDOT crews and travelers."

Two Gazex systems will be permanently installed at Blue Point/Blue Willow locations, remaining in place year-round. Three O'bellx systems will be placed at Mother Cline. The O'bellx base features are fixed and permanent, while the portable units holding the gasses will require resetting on site each winter with a helicopter.

The units are remotely controlled, which will reduce the amount of time spent on avalanche control missions. The new systems will also boost safety for crews who handle explosives, with methods like the Avalaunchers and the Howitzers used in other locations.

"Mother Cline and Blue Point/Blue Willow are our most active avalanche slide paths on US 550, and the Blue Point area is also a very popular spot for back-country skiers," CDOT Maintenance Area Supervisor Vance Kelso said. "With these remote systems, we can more effectively bring snow down during peak conditions, often at night, before the sun hits the paths and hardens the snow surface. Then, we can clear the debris on the highway before morning and have

things opened back up for the traveling public."

Every winter CDOT and its sister agency, the Colorado Avalanche Information Center, regularly monitor and control some 278 of 522 known avalanche paths located above Colorado highways. The monitoring and mitigation help prevent natural avalanches from impacting public travel. When there is a high risk of avalanche danger, CDOT will close highways at the locations of the avalanche paths in order to conduct avalanche control operations. While the road is closed to any traffic, avalanches are triggered. Maintenance crews with heavy equipment then clear the highway of any snow and debris that reached the road. The highway can then be re-opened for safer public travel.

Travel Impacts:

It is anticipated that travel impacts will occur primarily in the first two weeks as equipment is being mobilized to the site. Then travel will be impacted periodically, as necessary, for rockfall mitigation or other work-site activities.

Anticipated initial travel impacts: All work will be done from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday (some weekend work may be scheduled)

Tuesday, July 11: At MP 81, there will be full traffic holds that could last up to 20 minutes, then traffic queues will be cleared in each direction before the next hold Wednesday-Friday, July 12-14: Periods of single-lane, alternating traffic; and full traffic holds of up to 20 minutes are possible

Monday, July 17: At MP 81, full traffic holds of up to 20 minutes during morning hours; then full traffic holds at MP 89 (9 miles north of the summit) in the afternoon Travelers should consult <u>cotrip.org</u> for weekly updates on traffic impacts resulting from this work. Those interested may also contact the project team to receive weekly email updates.

# SUMMER ROAD CONSTRUCTION SEASON IS IN FULL SWING - WHERE'S THE CITY OF MONTROSE PUTTING OUR TAX MONEY?

MONTROSE-Anyone traveling east or
south of Montrose will encounter travel
delays due to road construction on US
Highways 50 and 550. Both are maintained
by the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) using the tax dollars obtained from us at the pump, through our
vehicle registration fees and other
sources. Road widening. Asphalt overlays.
Safety improvements. All are visible signs
of your tax dollars doing what they're intended to do.

Montrose County has, for the last 16 years, been the beneficiary of a voter approved 1% sales tax that funds many of the road and bridge maintenance and improvement projects we see taking place throughout Montrose County. As examples of this year's projects, the County recently completed an overlay project on High Mesa Road from Ida Road to Highway 348 - (4.5 miles) as well as paving of Gunnison Road from South River Road to Highway 50. Both are in the Olathe area. These projects were contracted to private companies who did beautiful work on these roads. Again, visible signs of your tax dollars at work with several more taking place countywide.

The City of Montrose too has road improvement and maintenance projects on deck. The biggest and most visible one currently in progress is the extension of 6700 Road from Sunnyside Road to Miami Road on the east side of the city. This project has been on the books since 1997 and

is just now being built! Yes, there were issues related to property and rights of way acquisition (most of which the city already had), but 26 years to get this done? I guess better late than never is all that can be said.

In addition, several curb and gutter projects are underway along with sidewalk replacements. However, rather than using precious tax dollars to repair roads that are in terrible shape such as Park Avenue from East Main Street to North 9th Street or Nevada Avenue north of East Main Street as well as many other key streets in need of repaving or other work (potholes come to mind), the City Council and City Manager pushed forward a scheme to close South 3rd Street between S. Townsend Avenue & Cascade Avenue to create another "pedestrian mall" and small parking lot for the use and benefit of the 300 or so Montrose Campus Colorado Mesa University students thereby closing yet another east-west street in the downtown

\$700,000 for this project was budgeted in 2023. Bids came in higher. It was then scaled back with additions to come later in order to meet the \$700,000 budget. That's a lot of road repair money wasted on a special interest project folks. This is on top of the recent private sale of the Historic City Hall to finance a \$2,000,000 endowment fund for CMU students and a culinary arts program to be housed in that building. (See a previous *Mirror* article on this sweetheart deal.)

It doesn't stop there. Over \$2 million of your tax dollars are going to the new Basecamp Apartment complex and the Fairfield Inn by Marriott for "horizontal improvements" (parking lot construction, asphalting, lighting, striping, landscaping, irrigation systems, etc.) (See photos of the construction in progress). Add to these projects over \$200,000 in new commercial kitchens installed at taxpayer expense in the recently relocated (to the Colorado Outdoors project) Trattoria di Sofia Italian restaurant and the new Pomona Brewing Co. restaurant located at N. Townsend & N. 9th Street.

Shelter Distilling of Mammoth Lakes, CA (they're building a new facility in the Colorado Outdoors project) just received a \$120,000 "gift" of your tax dollars for a wastewater pretreatment system that is typically paid for by the owner of a business. Your money was spent on this improvement to a private business under the guise of trying to not load up the City's wastewater plant with a potential 10% increase in industrial/organic waste all the while the City is in the midst of a \$67,000 study to determine how much they're going to raise our sewer rates to expand the wastewater plant! And Shelter has already received \$700,000 in additional funding (your money) for "horizontal" improvements like the Basecamp Apartments and Fairfield Inn!

Another example of your tax money not only going to special interests but also to

government employees was the purchase last year of a new Ford Expedition Limited Max with the Stealth Performance Package for City Manager Bill Bell's use (this SUV, as equipped, stickers out at a retail price of almost \$90,000!!). This vehicle is for his personal and City use 24/7 (including vacations or other personal needs). No doubt we're paying to insure it and to cover his family or other occupants in the event of an accident. Add this to the annual pay raises, bonuses, medical insurance for he and his family, pension plan, etc. that he receives yearly (typically after the City Council conducts their "closed door performance reviews" of him and updates his contract) and you have an incredibly lucrative package of benefits. No wonder he's outstayed almost every City Manager in Montrose history! And if all this public largesse isn't enough as the Democratic Socialists running this City ignore our crumbling public assets, it was recently discovered that a piece of City owned infrastructure (the dam in the Otter Pond subdivision) has begun to fail and the City told the residents in the subdivision that they were on their own to fix it in spite of public records clearly showing the City's ownership of it (since deeded to the city 29 years ago) as well as the road atop of the dam and the water and sewer lines buried in the dam (which no doubt have contributed to the failure). The City's token response to "help" out the taxpaying residents in the subdivision was to throw \$100,000 of Federal money they received for COVID-19 relief through the American Rescue Plan Act toward the estimated \$700,000 repair bill and to move their utilities at no cost to the homeowner's. How generous. I smell a lawsuit coming their way.

On and on it goes with this City Administration and elected officials bankrolling private

businesses by offering huge incentives to non-manufacturing hospitality types of employers whose lower paying jobs don't make living in a community where average rents are now in the \$1,500-\$2,000 per month range very easy to manage. Businesses who depend upon tourists and wealthier residents won't survive a recession when a worker's discretionary income evaporates with the inflationary increases in the cost of living and the inability of employers to keep wages on par with those increases.

As I've editorialized before, this insanity needs to stop.

We, the taxpayers of the City of Montrose, come first.

Not the special interests. Not the sweetheart deals with eateries and drinking establishments. Not with the good ole boys. Stand up and tell them to stop it before they run out of your money!



The highlight of that day was watching the team roping.




She loved painting landscapes and was a member of the Montrose Art Guild along with giving private lessons. She also enjoyed traveling and the many trips they took in their RV.

MONTROSE – Chang Thai has always been one of my favorite haunts. So, my son Ian and I were curious to see what was happening at this local favorite after the restaurant added to the menu and is now offering Japanese and Vietnamese foods. Well, it's not pretty. Perhaps we just didn't order the best?

Ian ordered what should have been a safe dish, the Vietnamese Pho, a bowl of beef bone broth with herbs and a choice of brisket, ground beef, raw beef or meatball. His choice was brisket & meatballs. (Two meats, \$16.99; three meats, \$17.99) The dish was overflowing with noodles and the meat. No crunchy veggies. He said it was tasty, but not great, and was soon slurping. He's had better Pho. Now, I consider myself a pretty good judge of sushi, having had the best. Not here. I ordered the California roll, safe huh? The presentation was surprising, with very big slices of sushi with shredded crab, sweet egg, cucumber in mayo sauce topped with sesame seed. Mayo sauce? What? Yes, of course it came with wasabi and ginger, but no little bowl in which to mix the wasabi & soy sauce (which was on the table). I had never had sushi served with a mayo dipping sauce. I had to ask for a small dipping bowl to mix my own

dipping sauce. The place was packed with locals trying out the new Chang ThaiViet & Japanese offerings and the one waitress was running around as fast as she could. Come on! It took awhile to get the little dipping bowl. It wasn't her fault. I actually felt sorry for her.

When I finally was set up to enjoy the sushi, I have to say I was a little more than disappointed. The pieces were cut so big they were difficult to eat. I flagged down the person clearing tables and asked for a knife. I had to try to cut them into two pieces so I could eat. No one's mouth is large enough to gobble these in one bite. The fork wasn't adequate and when I did manage to get a piece of sushi in my mouth it was not pretty.

The only thing I enjoyed about this meal was a glass of Cabernet.

The California roll tasted like it had been made ahead of time and sat around for a while. Not very fresh tasting like you'd expect with sushi. The rice was crumbly and a bit stiff. Yikes, and not fresh tasting. Come on, Chang Thai, if you're changing the menu, why? You had a perfectly wonderful thing going with Thai food. These new offerings don't seem to be able to compete with perfectly fine other restaurant offerings of Vietnamese and Japanese food around Montrose. If you're trying to



compete it's just not working. I suggest if diners go to Chang ThaiViet & Japanese you stick with the Thai, which has always been wonderful. You might want to consider going elsewhere if you want other cuisine.

Now the offerings in the new Chang ThaiViet & Japanese are many:

ramen; Thai garlic noodle and Pineapple fried rice. (\$ - \$20.99).

I'm sorry, neither the take-out menu nor the website has updated prices so I'm unable to give you the lowest appetizer price. The on-line menu has also not been updated with the Vietnamese or Japanese offerings.

#### Thai soups:

Tom yum soup; Tom kha soup; Wonton soup (hot pot) – choice of chicken of tofu (bowl \$9.49, pot \$12.49; choice of shrimp \$7.49-pot \$14.49; choice of seafood, shrimp, scallops, calamari bowl, \$16.49. Wonton soup (hot pot) \$12.49. I'm not sure but I think Chang Thai has used this menu change opportunity to raise the original prices; I could be wrong, but the soups do seem a little pricy. The Thai

offerings have always proved worth it, however. When my sweety Michael and I used to dine here (often) we always shared a hot pot of Tom yum soup and found it really wonderful.




